Tigard Garden Club would like to share a uniquely interesting field trip that many of us enjoyed this past February.

With Covid continually leaving our schedules in flux, we share here a really delightful excursion that your club might also enjoy.

Displayed items include numerous pieces from the 1926 Tualatin United Methodist Church building which stood on Boones Ferry Road for 80 years. The building was moved in 2006 to its present location and is now the Tualatin Heritage Center, co-operated by the city and the Tualatin Historical Society.

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In this quaint tucked-away location, you will find a treasure trove of historical information about the Willamette Valley, upcoming live programs, even a Glacial Erratic rock which is believed to have been carried via the Missoula Flood to our own Willamette Valley....15,000 to 35,000 years ago.

There is much to learn about the Atfalati band of the Kalapuyans, who were the first local inhabitants. One of the staples of their diet was the common camas which, along with many other native Tualatin plants, can be found growing in their attached historical garden.

While the City of Tualatin didn't pay our club to advertise their many amenities, we are pleased to do so. While Covid may have dampened our spirits for a couple of years, requiring us to use our imagination, we still found ways to gather.

Of course, no field trip would be complete without a friendly gathering of friends for lunch.

We have had Zoom meetings during those months with many interesting speakers as follows:

January 13, 2022

Dr. Dana Sanchez from the Dept. of Fisheries & Wildlife speaking on the topic of Dueling with Diggers. She explained how to control yard damage done by squirrels, gophers, moles, voles, birds and especially crows.

• February 10, 2022

Lauren Kraemer Professor of Family and Community Health speaking on the topic of Earthquake Preparedness. She covered sanitation and hygiene post disaster.

March 10, 2022

Nicole Forbes from 7 Dee's Nursery speaking on the topic of Container Gardens. Nicole gave us lots of special plant ideas to use in our own yards and in creating containers for our plant sale.

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The Beaverton Garden Club has had a busy last three months of January, February and March.

Our first in-person meeting will be April 14, 2022 at our new meeting place of Westbrook Clubhouse in Beaverton. We'll spend most of our time with final planning and organizational details for our plant sale on Saturday, April 30, from 8:30 to 2:00. Special features will be large and small containers, house plants, native plants, pollinator plants and a raffle of donated gift cards, containers, fertilizer, etc. from local nurseries. We usually have over 2,000, one gallon perennials, plus herbs, 4 inch garden vegetables and succulents. We, also, have shrubs and sometimes smaller trees.

We've had several Zoom meetings of the Plant Sale Planning Committee, plus a number of plant "digs" in member's yards where there are many plants to dig.

All unpurchased plants are donated to Habitat for Humanity at the end of the day. All the proceeds of the sale are donated to philanthropies such as Penny Pines, Promise Trees, H.O.P.E. (Helping Our Precious Elders Organization), 4H members, District Scholarships, Oregon Garden, Veteran's Memorial Park, Elsie Stuhr Remembrance Garden, and the Beaverton Library.

We're looking forward to a busy and energizing Spring!!
