McMinnville Garden Club

West End Welcome project -

This project began development in February of 2013 with final completion in October of the same year. The hanging baskets came the next spring and currently we have two summer baskets and two winter baskets that hang on the new post. This property is owned by Linfield College and maintained by the McMinnville Public Works department and the McMinnville Garden Club.

During our discussions with the City it was determined that a professional landscape designer should be brought on board as well as a professional landscape company to do the demolition as well as replanting of the area.

The Garden Club ordered a post for hanging baskets which required a cement pad and the garden club members assisted the landscape company in installing this along with the hanging basket post.

A new watering system was installed for the new planting area and a drip system for the hanging baskets. The landscape plan included the planting of shore pine trees along the backside which will eventually shield the view of an empty parking lot behind.

The new plants are perennials that provide color through the spring and summer months and structure during the winter months. The Garden Club maintains the planting area and the city maintains the grass area.

Total budget: \$9,000

McMinnville Garden Club Members Step Out

November and December find the McMinnville Garden Club members stepping out to a multitude of activities. First, a group will be heading to the Milwaukie, Portland area for some fun "Junkin". In July, we participated in Newberg's annual Old Fashioned Festival. We have a table at the Hoover Minthorn House Museum (the only presidential property in the Pacific Northwest). Our club maintains the herb garden there and we use the event to promote our club, gardening in general and herbs in particular. This year we featured our famous herbal spa water and home made herbal crackers.

We had several enjoyable outings over the summer as well. Two club members attended the McMinnville Garden Club's 15th annual garden tour and faire in June. Various members attended an open house at Terra Nova Nursery, Al's Sherwood Ladies Night Out and a gardening class at Farmington Gardens. Whew!

Part of the proceeds from our annual plant sale go back to the community. This month, a check for \$140 was presented to the Newberg Library to purchase children's gardens books. We received a nice note from Mary Lynn Thomas, Children's Librarian, which said, "We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for generously donating to the children's garden collection at Newberg Public Library. This year our Latino Services staff member will purchase three selections for the children's Spanish collection. She is very grateful for this opportunity."

A follow-up report on our seed planting last Spring: We planted the provided seeds in a prominent spot in Newberg. Unfortunately it was hot and the location did not have a watering system. Some plants came up. The good news is the City of Newberg liked the idea so much they are going to put in an irrigation system, replant and expand the area with the same company's seed!

We support the District Scholarship Fund, Hoyt Arboretum, Oral Hull Gardens for the Blind, and Willamette National Cemetery. During the 2013-2015 administration our club was the Chair for the State President's Project, "Water for Guatemala."

We co-hosted the 2015 Fall District Meeting and participated in the Pink Panther Sale.

For over 40 years we have maintained Eden Garden located at 8855 SW Canyon Road. The surrounding community - businesses and individuals - help support this garden. A Yard Sale to help finance the costs of the garden will be held in the Summer of 2016.

We began the year with an Art Project featuring recycled books. Each member designed a cover. Pages will include photos, poems, quotations, leaves, and many other materials which will be shared at the end of the garden club year. The Memory Books will be keepsakes.

Programs have included a Field Trip to Eden Garden, Bird Houses covered with seeds for our feathered friends, and miniature tea cups filled with small floral designs.

Marie Nelson, one of our ACTIVE charter members, passed away July 7, 2015 just months short of her 100th birthday. A clematis was planted at Eden Garden in her honor.

Projects

Several Pioneer District Clubs have reported progress on special projects at all levels, and as such are supporting the Pioneer District Director's project to encourage participation in all the National, Regional and State efforts.

Monarch Watch —a collaborative effort by National Garden Clubs, Inc. and several other National organizations is slowly finding success. Just this month. It was announced that after suffering nearly catastrophic declines, the Fall migration numbers have risen Planting milkweed seeds and plants is helping. There are several locations in our Portland Metropolitan region that carry seeds and plants of the native milkweed. You can contact the Oregon Milkweed Project in North Portland at facebook.com/oregonmilkweed for more information. Or go to the website for the Xerces Society for the locations where seed can be ordered. There may be a minimum order required for some locations.

Gardeners Supply also has milkweed seeds available in seed balls that are reasonably priced. They are also one of our NGC partners, so mention that you are an NGC member and you night get a discount.

The Frightened Frog - a delightful book on the plight of our amphibian population, is not in its 4th printing as of November 1st. Many District Clubs have ordered multiple copies to donaye to their local schools and libraries. Single copies with shipping are about \$15. If twenty or more copies are ordered, there is a discount of 10%. If over thirty are ordered, the discount is 20%, bringing the overall cost to just under \$10 a copy including shipping. This is a fantastic holiday gift for children in K-4th Grade and the lesson plans are downloadable from the NGC website.

Think frogs aren't important? When was the last time you heard a frog croaking in your own neighborhood? Tree frogs have just started their melodious calls this month. Even areas near wetlands have been silent this year.

And of curse, remember the pollinators, bees, butterflies etc. Use care with insecticides. Read the labels and better yet, do not use them. Rely on natural means of insect control. They do work.

Plant Trees and Shrubs - This is a Pacific Region project. Report to your District Director what members have planted. All Pioneer Clubs received a start of Oregon Grape. It's not too late to get it in the ground. Consider what each of you has planted and report it.

Share the Bounty—Top the Scales - Our State Project is seeing great results. Out in Columbia County, all three clubs have been involved in community gardens. In fact Scappoose and St. Helens have an annual competition to see which garden donated the most to the Columbia Pacific Food Bank. This year, the St. Helens Community Garden and club members donated over 3,500 pounds of produce. Scappoose donated almost 3,000 pounds. The club members have also personally donated

Several hundred pounds of food. Recipients of these donations include families, as well as the Senior Centrs and Community Meals Programs.

At this holiday season, remember that canned goods and processed foods, as well as cash are welcome. Just take them to your local food bank and get a tax receipt. Every dollar donated is equsl to five pounds of food. Make a copy of the receipt and turn it in to the contact person in your club, who will then report it to the District. The District will compile the data and report it to the State. Please remember that foods beyond their pull date should not be donated. It cannot be used and ends up in the landfill.
