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GETTING TO KNOW THE TIGARD GARDEN CLUB

The Tigard Garden Club will celebrate its 69th birthday this year with 42 members. We meet the first Wednesday of every month, September through June, at the Tigard Sr. Center.

Our club focuses on education, community projects and having a fun and sociable membership. Since we all love to eat, our meetings start off with a full lunch and social hour, hosted by a rotating team of members, which probably accounts for our near 100% attendance each month. Meetings include a presentation on gardening practices, horticulture or conservation by member Master Gardener Carol Tracy followed by a professional speaker for our regular program. Our January speaker was Don Sprague, owner of Garden Gallery Iron Works who gave us a delightful program on catching moles and gophers. Every other year we hold our in-house semistandard flower show which includes awards and special critiques by our own State Accredited Judge, Mary Clinton.

Besides our meetings, we conduct monthly field trips to tour private or public gardens, nurseries, historical places or other We love to tour and interesting venues. recently we've enjoyed such fun visits as the Cannon Beach Cottage and Garden Tour, Mike Darcy's private garden, Bosky Dell Natives, KÁTU'S AM Northwest TV show, Pistils Nursery on Mississippi and Digs on Alberta, Nancyland, Portland Nursery Apple Tasting Event and The Oregon Garden among others. And of course, these trips always include lunch afterwards at a nearby restaurant. In June, everyone had a great time at our biggest event of the year, our 7th Annual Members Garden Tour & Progressive Lunch where we toured 3 of our members' gardens and enjoyed our moving lunch along the way. (Did I mention that we love to eat?) We ended the year with our wonderful annual Christmas party at Mary Clinton's beautiful home.

Our club has a long history of community service. We always have an on-going number of projects that keep us busy. Yearly, we support the Tigard Senior Center dining room by planting and maintaining a culinary herb garden for the kitchen chef. Starting early in spring, a large group of our members start digging in raised beds and plant a full array of herbs and some vegetables maintaining them throughout the Every October, we raise our summer. "Thanksgiving Tree" to support the Caring Closet in Tigard. Tags on the tree are drawn by members for K-12 clothing needs and then member donations are delivered 2 weeks before Thanksaiving. Later in the year, we hold a member donated hygiene kit drive for the Caring Closet as well. In May, we gather to make 75-100 Mother's Day corsages for all the women on the Tigard Loaves & Fishes route. At

Loaves & Fishes route. At Christmas members donate clothing and food for the Tigard Good Neighbor Homeless Center. In memory of members who have passed away we created and maintain a beautiful Memory Garden at the Sr. Center for everyone to enjoy. This past year we partnered with the City of Tigard to plant wildflowers in open areas around Tigard parks and trails and will do this again in early spring. We recently began a project to plant 1500 daffodil and tulip bulbs provided by the city to help beautify Tigard and in early December we began this project by planting the first 500 bulbs at the Tigard Sr. Center.

Also during the past year we made a number of major monetary donations to various community organizations throughout the area as selected by our membership. Among those, we helped Alberta Rider Elementary School create the Alberta Rider Memorial Learning Garden around her original old log home on school grounds, and helped the Bethlehem House of Bread Community Garden purchase a many needed materials. And of course, we support the Pennies for Pines project and have helped to reforest 7 plantations.

We're all pretty proud of our club!

OSFGC, Inc. will have a state wide photography contest. Photos must have been taken between January, 2015 and April 1, 2016. Photos can be digital or film photos, and should not be enhanced by any computer program other than conversion from color to black and white. Photos must be 8"x10" and matted, not to exceed 11"x14" inches. No Framed photos will be accepted. The categories are as follows:

1. *Landscapes/Seascapes* A. Color B. Black and White

2. *Gardens* A. Color B. Black and White 3. *Floral* A. Color B. Black and White

4. *Birds, Butterflies, Insects* A. Color B. Black and White

5. Pets A. Color B. Black and White

6. Wildlife A. Color B. Black and White

7. *President's Choice*: –Subject - Frogs A. Color or Black and White

Clubs should hold a local contest and choose a first place winner from each category. There is a possibility of 13 winning photos from each club. These first place winners will then be presented to their respective District representative to be judged at the District level. Districts will select the first place winning photograph from each category to be displayed and judged at the State Convention. Winner in each division at the state level will receive a certificate and ribbon.

16th Annual Garden Tour and Faire—McMinnville

The McMinnville Garden Club has begun promoting its 16th Annual Garden Tour and Faire and encouraging people to reserve Sunday, June 26, for the festivities. This year's theme is borrowed from an Audrey Hepburn quote: "To Plant a Garden Is to Believe in Tomorrow". The Tour and Faire have garnered a well-deserved reputation for being one of the Willamette Valley's premier garden events. Participants are encouraged to visit five unique private gardens and to browse the offerings of many varied garden-oriented vendors. With McMinnville's enviable location in the very heart of Wine Country, attendees are also provided numerous unique eating and sipping opportunities.

The cost of admission into the Tour Gardens is \$10.00. Proceeds of the Tour are directed toward funding three scholarships offered to students pursuing horticulturerelated college degrees and toward community-oriented beautification projects. The Tour Gardens open at 10:00 a.m. and remain open until 4:00 p.m. Tour participants may Tour all or some of the Gardens at their own pace in any order they choose.

The Faire is free and open to all between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. The Faire is staged in McMinnville's much publicized picturesque Historic Downtown area. The heart of the Faire is at Third and Cowls Streets with adequate parking in the surrounding streets and city lots. Varied eateries and wine tasting rooms are just steps away. A special feature at the Faire is the Kiddie Corner that allows children (and young-at-heart adults) to create their own Fairy Gardens.

OREGON CAMELLIA SOCIETY

The Oregon Camellia Society held its first meeting in January, 1942, when a small group of camellia enthusiasts met to draw up by-laws. OCS has a current membership of 35 and is one of the oldest camellia societies in the country.

The 1942 by-laws defined the society's objectives thus: to promote and stimulate interest in growing and caring for Camellias. Camellias arrived in Oregon during frontier days, with the oldest plant believed to have been carried west by pioneers and planted in Sutherlin, Oregon. Gradually new varieties were introduced to the region, whose mild climate was ideal for camellia culture.

The 1940s was a decade during which camellia culture enjoyed great growth in popularity across the country. In like manner, by 1949 OCS membership had grown from fifty to three hundred. The society's motto was to "Know, Grow and Show Camellias," and early flower shows drew huge crowds. The March, 1942, show (at the Portland Art Museum) attracted around 7,000. In 1949, attendance was estimated at 25,000.

In the 1950s, the camellia show moved to the 10th floor auditorium of the Meier and Frank building in downtown Portland. Later, other venues included various suburban malls and the Portland Japanese Gardenden. In April 2009, the OCS show moved to the Newberg Camellia Festival in the "City of Camellias," where the Chehalem Garden Club makes the flower show more special by lining the exhibit hall's window sills with striking camellia arrangements.

We OCS members let ourselves in for goodnatured teasing because of our single-minded devotion to camellia plants. Yet we haven't really strayed from the objectives set out in the society's earliest by-laws. Then as now, OCS is dedicated to promoting camellias. Decades ago, the society selected a "Camellia of the Year" each spring to plant along the circular drive at the entrance to the Shriners Hospital for Children (then located at NE 82nd and Sandy Boulevard in Portland). These days, OCS propagates unusual camellia cultivars for eventual planting in local communities.

All are welcome to join the OCS. But whether you become a member or not, we hope you'll pick up a few hard-to-find camellias at our periodic sales and bring your best blooms to the April show. We love to see new exhibitors go home with trophies!
