McMinnville Garden Club

The McMinnville Garden Club was organized in 1926. We have about 93 members with usually 50 to 60 regularly attending meetings. We meet on the third Monday of each month beginning in September and ending in June. Our meetings are held at the Hillside activity room at the Manor from 9:30 to noon. The highlight of our annual projects is our annual Garden Tour and Faire. It is always held in June, the Sunday following Father's Day; 2014 was our 14th year. This special event allows over 600 visitors to personally visit five beautiful gardens in McMinnville and to also attend the Garden Faire which is held downtown with fifty or more vendors whose wares range from plant material to garden art and furniture. It has become one of our signature events for our town.

This spring, we were very busy, working toward our annual Garden Tour and Faire, as usual. It is our only fund raiser and requires participation from all of our members to be successful. This year there were approximately 660 tickets sold. Our club was also asked to provide center pieces for the Downtown Association dinner as well as the State Convention's closing banquet.

To celebrate the National Garden Club week, we placed flowers with the meals served for Meals on Wheels. This year we auctioned a fairy garden donated by one of our members at the Amity Daffodil Festival with the proceeds going to the water project in Guatemala. Last year, we completed a community beautification project that included a hanging basket post, trees, shrubs and perennials to highlight the "Welcome" entry to the city from the South and West.

Fall brings plans for field trips to the Hoyt arboretum, leaf casting as a craft activity, Bag Ladies and Gents on Third Street (trimming the ivy in the tree wells) and readying the city to receive visitors to the Small Town Convention being held in early October.

Some of our on-going community projects are:

- Maintaining planting beds in front of the Post Office
- Caring for indoor plants at the Public Library
- Cleaning up Third Street tree wells
- Maintaining new planting beds at the southwest entry to the city
- Awarding scholarships to three students each year
- Providing hanging baskets for the city


